Read Write Inc Phonics

- The Government requires schools to teach Early Reading Skills using an approved phonics teaching programme.
- At Potters Gate and St. Andrew's, we have invested in RWI phonics.

 RWI Phonics is a simple, well structured literacy programme which is proven to raise standards in literacy rapidly when taught with fidelity and commitment.

Read Write Inc. Phonics

Who is RWI phonics for?

- Children learning to read in YR– Y2
- Older children who need to 'catch up'

Each half-term, we assess and group our children based on their stage or reading (not their reading age).

This means that all children practise reading at the right level.



RWI at St Cuthbert Mayne

At St Cuthbert Mayne, all children in R/KS1 and some children in Year 3 and 4 are taught phonics at 9am. In reception, the children are taught within their class. The rest of the children have been assessed and placed in 6 groups.

By grouping our children in this way, it means our children are being taught exactly at their level giving them the best chance to succeed.

What is phonics?

Sounds

All words are made up of individual sounds. These sounds are merged together to form words.

e.g. in 'mat' we have the sounds 'm' 'a' 't in 'ship' we have the sounds 'sh' 'i' 'p'

Graphemes

A grapheme is another name for the letters we use to write the sound.



English alphabetic code

- 44 sounds
- 26 letters
- Over 150+ graphemes (letter combinations)

In English, we have more than 150 ways to represent 44 sounds using the 26 letters in the alphabet.

This makes our language one of the most complex alphabetic codes in the world.





In RWI, connections are made for the children in the teaching of Set 1 Sounds.

The shape of each letter has been changed into a picture that is the same shape as the letter. This is called a **pictogram.** This helps children hold onto the connection.

m looks like two mountains.

- s looks like a snake.
- a looks like an apple.
- d looks like a dinosaur.

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

Set 2 and 3 Sounds

Set 2 sounds

We teach the children to read the long vowel sounds and to read and spell words containing those vowels.

We use a brief story and Fred to help the children connect to the sounds.

Set 3 Sounds


We teach children different ways to read and spell the Set 2 vowel sounds. We say, 'same sound, different spelling.'

Again, we use a brief story and Fred to help the children connect to the sounds.

We only teach the common graphemes.

Fred Talk routine

- 1. Say the word in sounds as Fred e.g. c-a-t.
- 2. Ask your child to repeat. Can they 'jump-in' with the whole word?
- 3. Say the word in sounds followed by the whole word e.g. c-a-t, cat
- 4. Ask your child to repeat

What can I do at home?

- 1. Speak like Fred throughout the day
- 2. Play Fred games
- 3. Use 'Fred Talk, read the word' to read words



Set 1 sounds including special friends

When the children can blend single letter sounds, they move onto Ditties.

Ditties are short, phonically decodable passages based on the letter sounds learned in Speed Sounds Set 1.

We send home ditty sheets to be read at home.





Ditty sheets

Speed sounds

Ask your child to 'teach' you the speed sounds. They say 'a' and you repeat etc.

Green words

Your child reads the green words to you by using Fred Talk and blending the sounds together.

Red words

These are tricky words that can't be decoded phonetically. Tell your child the word if they are stuck.

Ditty

Ask your child to read the ditty to you. Encourage them to read it again and again to increase fluency and accuracy.

Ditty 1: pop

Speed Sounds - read the sounds (not the letter name)

agtpnsdoi

Green Words - read these words by blending the sounds together

not got sip pop dad did dog

Red Words - read these words but tell your child the word if they get stuck

I got pop

dad got a sip

the dog did not





RWI Story Books

Once the children can read and blend sounds in Set 1, they move onto the RWI Story Books.

These books have been carefully written so that they contain only the sounds that the children have been taught.

Each Story Book lesson consists:

- 10 minutes speed sound lesson focussing on one sound
- 35 minutes focussing on the Story Book. We teach the sounds, green and red words from the story before the children read to give them the best chance of being successful. Each Story book is taught over five days to include multiple readings by the children.

RWI phonics programme includes a writing element. We do not use this as we prefer to teach our own writing lessons based on high-quality and engaging texts.










Book Bag Books

- The children's reading practice at home.
- Please record when you listen to your child read their Book Bag Book in their reading record.
- Reinforce children's learning of phonics at the appropriate level.
- Helps to make even faster progress in reading.













What can you do?

- Listen to your child read the Book Bag Book again and again
- Encourage them to use 'Special Friends', 'Fred Talk', 'read the word'
- Discuss the story and encourage their storyteller voice.


