### SAFEGUARDING REMINDER

It will come as no surprise to hear that the children's safety is paramount. As such we cannot allow parents or carers to enter the school building without having signed in at the school office first. Please adhere to the following guidelines:

**Reception**: please drop your children with the teacher at the gate to the EYFS playground.

**Year 1:** either drop your children at the main school gate or accompany them to the start of the passageway by the bike shelter.

Year 2 and above: please drop your children at the main school gate.

Of course we understand that occasionally children might want to be accompanied a little further or might need some help putting their bike or scooter away - please try to remember to mention this to me or the member of SLT on the gate.

If you need to pass a message to your child's teacher in the morning then please mention this to me or the member of SLT on the gate or to the office staff. If you feel that you might need to have a longer conversation with the class teacher then please make an appointment by contacting the office. The end of the school day is probably an easier time to have a brief conversation with your child's teacher if necessary.

#### **Y1 MILESTONES TRIP**

The children learnt about homes from the past and were given opportunities to compare them with those from the present. Using a room set of a kitchen and a living room from the 1950s, the children were able to see what a house would have looked like when their grandparents were children. The children were given an object and they had to ask and answer questions to work out its purpose. The children were then given feely bags containing items relating to a particular domestic chore. They had to work collaboratively to work out that it was all the items used to wash clothes!







The children got to dress up in a range of outfits from a variety of jobs and social classes.











The children got to explore the Victorian streets of the museum. We listened to riddles and had to work out what shop/place the riddle was referring to. We went to the pier to use old pennies to play arcade games from the 1950s. We also got to go to the sweet shop and get a ration of sweets!

### **Y2 ARE HISTORIANS**

On Monday we had a 'Great Fire of London' morning, where we re-enacted the key events of the Great Fire. We learnt to sing London's Burning and pretended to be the fire and burning buildings. We had a 'fake museum' where we looked at various pieces of 'evidence' that have been used to help inform us about life in the past and The Great Fire of London itself. We started to think deeply about the pieces of evidence and what we can learn from them. It was great fun thinking about why their frying pans had such long handles! The majority of the class felt that Samuel Pepy's diary was the most useful piece of evidence, because he had written it during the actual fire – a perfect eye-witness account!













### POSITIVE AND RESPECTFUL PARKING

We continue to be very grateful to all our parents that park and stride/cycle/walk to school, and to those that park safely and respectfully around the neighbouring roads.

We are aware that some people continue to park on the yellow zig-zag lines outside the school and the church car park. Pupil Premium is additional funding to raise the attainment of particular pupils of all abilities and to close the gaps between them and their peers.

At St. Cuthbert Mayne, we believe that the highest possible standards can only be achieved by having the highest expectations of all learners. Some pupils from particular backgrounds require additional support; therefore, we will use all the resources available to help them reach their full potential.

When your child starts at our school, we ask you to complete a form in order for us to assess eligibility, however, we are fully aware that family circumstances may have changed since then. We would therefore encourage all families to review the form again and thus enable us to identify any further children who may be eligible to PP funding. ### Ukrainian Appeal

The children preparing to make their First Holy Communion were invited to physically contribute to this appeal but it was suggested that the whole parish might like to be involved . We are very aware that we all have many demands on our income at the moment so please remember that prayers are also very important and make a vital contribution if that is how you choose to support this request.

The Diocese has a wonderful Ukrainian priest serving the parish of Walton on Thames and he has been transporting goods to Ukraine since the beginning of the war. They have been supporting an orphanage in the Western part of the country which has taken children from the fighting in the East. Aside from the displacement and loss they have suffered, the winter is coming and without electricity they are struggling with the cold. We can help by providing **NEW** hats/gloves/scarves/ thick socks for any age child up to 20. We encouraged the FHC children to think of a present they might like someone to buy for them this Christmas and to consider if they could instead buy that for a Ukrainian child. Please leave everything unwrapped as it may need to be examined.
