



Year 4 had a busy day on Wednesday where they enjoyed a Live Zoom lesson from the Natural History Museum about volcanoes before modelling the human digestive system using freezer bags, paper cups and a pair of tights!

And of course, who could forget our belated World Book Day celebrations. Throughout the week children have enjoyed reacting to the bell which indicated the start of our ten minute DEAR (drop everything and read) sessions. We all enjoyed seeing the fantastic array of costumes, and it is a great chance to remind everybody of both the importance of reading regularly and the joy that it brings.



RWI BOOK AMNESTY



As a school, we have heavily invested in the Book Bag Books which relate to the Read, Write, Inc phonics scheme that we teach. It is important that every child in a group can read the same book at home so that we can ask the children comprehension questions about what they have read. Unfortunately, a high number of books have not been returned or been returned to us damaged. We understand that accidents do happen, and sometimes books are lost, but we need to replace each damaged or lost book.

YEAR 6 CLASS WE ARE VICTORIANS!

On Wenesday, Year 6 were immersed in historical enquiry as they dived deeper into the Victorian era. We were visited by Horsham museum who gave us a real-life taste of being at a Victorian school, allowing us to compare how Victorian schooling differed to education today. We handled real artefacts and had to deduce what they were used for and find their modern equivalent. We were then presented with a conundrum - would we have chosen to live on the streets or enter the workhouse? To answer this question, we investigated what society was like at the time by interpreting different sources - artefacts, images and a Victorian census - before discussing and comparing our ideas. Like the Victorians themselves, we didn't all share the same views!

SCIENCE FAIR

This term, St. Cuthbert Mayne will be holding a Science Fair. We would love your child to take part. To enter your child must carry out a scientific investigation and the produce a presentation based on what they've done. They must include; their scientific question (e.g. which material conducts electricity the best?) a write up of what they did, plus graphs and tables to support their findings. The layout should be as below (or similar):







The children can also produce handouts or extras to go with their entry if they wish. If your child would like to enter but is not sure what to do please see some suggested questions that they could investigate below:

Animals including humans

How does the length of time we exercise for affect our heart rate? How does age affect a human's reaction time?

Plants

How does a seed change as it germinates?

Do some seeds grow more quickly than others?

Forces

How does the size of a parachute affect the time it takes to fall to the ground? How do rockets work?

Earth and Space

What would humans have to do to be able to survive on Mars? How does being in space for a long time effect the human body?

Materials

Which material will make the best black-out blinds/curtains? Which are the best kitchen towels for mopping up spills?

Light

How do shadows change over a day?

Your child could decide to pick one of these questions to investigate. Or they could come up with their own question to base their project on.

Alternatively, they could research a scientist and produce a display about their life and work. The scientist does not have to be famous and could be someone that your child knows.

Entries need to ready for display at the Science Fair on Tuesday 14th March 2023, the event will be held after school. The winner will be announced in a special assembly and will receive a trophy. The lucky winner and runners up will then be invited to the Xavier Science Fair Grand Final at The Royal Holloway University on Monday 27th March 2023! We will be holding some lunchtime support sessions if children require any. We look forward to seeing their fantastic entries.

SAFEGUARDING REMINDER

It will come as no surprise to hear that the children's safety is paramount. As such we cannot allow parents or carers to enter the school building without having signed in at the school office first. Please adhere to the following guidelines:

Reception: please drop your children with the teacher at the gate to the EYFS playground.

Year 1: either drop your children at the main school gate or accompany them to the start of the passageway by the bike shelter.

Year 2 and above: please drop your children at the main school gate.

Of course we understand that occasionally children might want to be accompanied a little further or might need some help putting their bike or scooter away - please try to remember to mention this to me or the member of SLT on the gate.

If you need to pass a message to your child's teacher in the morning then please mention this to me or the member of SLT on the gate or to the office staff. If you feel that you might need to have a longer conversation with the class teacher then please make an appointment by contacting the office. The end of the school day is probably an easier time to have a brief conversation with your child's teacher if necessary.

POSITIVE AND RESPECTFUL PARKING

We continue to be very grateful to all our parents that park and stride/cycle/walk to school, and to those that park safely and respectfully around the neighbouring roads.

We are aware that some people continue to park on the yellow zig-zag lines outside the school and the church car park. Rule 243 of the Highway Code states that road users must not park near a school entrance; for the safety of all the children at St Cuthbert Mayne, we would ask that all members of our community adhere to this rule and do not park on the yellow zig-zag lines.

We must also ensure that we are polite and respectful to local residents at all times.

Please show your children, by your actions, that positive and respectful parking is a way to show that you care about other pedestrians, neighbours and road users. Be a good role model!

Think carefully before you click on or open something online (e.g. links, adverts, friend requests, photos) as you never know where they may lead to or they may contain viruses. Do not accept something if you are unsure of who the person is or what they've sent you.





You cannot trust everything you see online as some things can be out of date, inaccurate or not entirely true. To find reliable information compare at least three different websites, check in books and talk to someone about what you have found.

Pupil Premium is additional funding to raise the attainment of particular pupils of all abilities and to close the gaps between them and their peers.

At St. Cuthbert Mayne, we believe that the highest possible standards can only be achieved by having the highest expectations of all learners. Some pupils from particular backgrounds require additional support; therefore, we will use all the resources available to help them reach their full potential.

When your child starts at our school, we ask you to complete a form in order for us to assess eligibility, however, we are fully aware that family circumstances may have changed since then. We would therefore encourage all families to review the form again and thus enable us to identify any further children who may be eligible to PP funding. The forms themselves also contain information about eligibility criteria.






STRIKE ACTION
